Free schoolbooks for all primary school pupils. Information for parents/quardians.

From September 2023, schoolbooks, workbooks and copybooks for children in primary schools, including special schools, will be provided to every child free by their school. There is no charge to parents/guardians for this, as schools now receive funding from Government to cover these costs.

Schools must prioritise the use of the funding to cover all costs of textbooks, workbooks and copybooks. The schoolbooks and workbooks will be on loan to the children. They must be returned at the end of the school year, or if the child leaves the school. It is important that books are kept in good condition so they can be re-used. Please help make sure your child/children keep the school books safe and takes care of them, so they can be used again by another child. There may be a requirement for parents to buy some additional items for children to use at school. All children in the class will have access to the schoolbooks, workbooks and copybooks that they need.

Invite your friend to join in on games and activities. Teach them how to play. They might want to be included but don't know how to ask.




Learn about your friend's interests. You may find out you have things in common.

In SESE, this month we have been learning about Spring; a beautiful time in nature which brings with it new life.



We have been getting outside and planting some fruit and vegetables with Mrs Finn and Angela. What better way to encourage children's sense of wonder and curiosity than getting outside and cultivating new life in our vegetable garden.



Ms King's Junior and Senior Infants took to the garden to plant a variety of beans and peas in our environmentally friendly cardboard pots. In the coming weeks we will

have to learn the value of patience, respect and responsibility as we nurture these plants and help them to grow. We learned that plants need water, sunlight and soil to grow, which raised curiosity about where the water goes once the roots absorb it.



So.... where does the water go?

Ms King's Infants prepared an interesting experiment to see what happens to the water that plants drink. We put white flowers into coloured water and observed with awe as the petals changed colour over a few hours.
